When I was coming up, Sunday morning was for worship, and Sunday afternoon meant dinner at my grandparent's house with aunts, uncles, and cousins. These days, many of us live in places where our closest relative is a plane ride away. Yet, as journalist Jane Howard said, "Call it a clan, call it a network, call it a tribe, call it a family. Better still, we can imagine a bright arrow pointing to where we are in life, proclaiming, “God is here!”


